# INTRODUCTION

Dear Friends,



The real litmus test of a hospital is not how many patients she sees—although that is certainly important—but what is the quality of care that a patient receives.

In 1979, when I witnessed the loving and holistic care that patients received at Harpur Memorial Hospital in Menouf, whether Christian or Muslim, old or young, wealthy or poor, I decided to work for the hospital as a medical doctor, and later became her Director. This loving care was part of the original vision of Frank Harpur, an Irish doctor who started the hospital in 1910, and is still one of the main reasons why Harpur Memorial Hospital continues to grow and is a blessing to the community today.

Thirty years ago the hospital treated approximately 2,000 patients per year. Since then the hospital has expanded and the number of outpatients has grown, especially in the last five years under the leadership of Dr. Samir Rizkallah, the current director. In 2013, we saw more than 122,000 outpatients at Harpur Memorial Hospital, with over 95% of the patients being Muslims who trust and support this Christian hospital.

Why does Harpur Memorial Hospital have such a good reputation? It is because we have well-trained doctors, nurses and staff who provide excellent health care at a very low and affordable cost. It is because our outpatient department provides all diagnostic and curative services in the same day rather than admitting inpatients, thus reducing the cost for patients. It is because Harpur Memorial Hospital plays an important role in building bridges between different faith communities—a role which is very much needed at this time in Egypt when faith communities are increasingly becoming polarized. It is because the whole person is treated, not just the symptoms, the disease or the illness.

Because of the tremendous growth in the number of patients and the greater demands on the hospital outpatient clinic, I am asking you to help support a new outpatient department. The current building is seriously inadequate for the numbers of patients who come to be treated at the hospital each day, and urgently needs replacing. I invite you to partner with us.

I also request your prayer that we continue to communicate God's love to all who come to seek healing at Harpur Memorial Hospital in Menouf.

For many of them in this city of 700,000 people, Harpur is their only contact with the message and love of Jesus.

# PROJECT SUMMARY

# Vision

Harpur Memorial Hospital in Menouf is committed to serving the community by providing high-quality affordable healthcare to all, regardless of social, economic or religious status.

# Project Overview

For over 100 years, Harpur Memorial Hospital in Menouf has provided compassionate healthcare to the people of Menoufia, a region in the delta of Egypt. Harpur Memorial Hospital is a full service hospital with 75 beds and 24-hour staffing.

In recent years as its medical services have improved, it has drawn increasing numbers of patients. In 2013, over 122,000 outpatients were treated; double the number of patients only 4 years earlier!

The current outpatient building is one of the original buildings of the hospital, built in the early 20th century. It was not designed to accommodate the current patient load, which often exceeds 500 patients per day. The outpatient facility urgently needs upgrading to accommodate the continued growth. An international group of engineers have designed a new two-storey building, which will be constructed in three phases.

# Budget

The total cost of the project is **\$3,311,000 USD**. The Diocese has already put **\$435,000 USD** of its own money into the project, and has succeeded in fundraising an additional **\$190,000 USD**.

We are seeking to raise the remaining **\$2,686,000 USD** to complete the project.



# ABOUT HARPUR MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

## History

At the end of the 19th Century, motivated by the love of God and the desire to serve his fellow brothers and sisters, Irish medical doctor Frank Harpur came to provide medical care for Egyptians.

Dr. Harpur established a small hospital in Old Cairo, but soon realized that the need for medical care increased the further one travels away from Cairo. He asked himself: "How can I reach out to these deprived areas?" He purchased a sailboat (dahabia) to be the first floating hospital on the Nile and used to set up tent hospitals in villages in the delta region. In one of his trips, Frank Harpur reached a village in Menoufia. One of the elders of the village welcomed him to set up the tents in his field, and then asked him to establish a permanent hospital in the area.

Menouf, the then capital of Menoufia, was chosen to be the location for its first hospital. In this way, the welcome and hospitality of the Egyptian people joined with the love and expertise of the Irish people to form this unique hospital. After the death of Dr. Harpur, the Anglican Church, who owned the hospital, dedicated the hospital in his memory because he dedicated his life to serve his patients.







## The Story Continues

The story of love and giving that started 100 years ago is continued today by Egyptian doctors with the same spirit of service.

Harpur Memorial Hospital exists to serve the community. It has a reputation for compassionate health care, and the poor are never turned away. The services are provided at an affordable prices and subsidies are provided for the very poor. For many, Harpur is the only opportunity for quality medical care which is affordable for them. The public hospitals do not provide a decent level of care, and the private hospitals charge high fees for their services.

The hospital provides excellent medical care for all people regardless of ethnic, social, economic or religious status. The hospital has become known for this impartial and humane approach within the region of Menoufia.

Harpur Memorial Hospital is a full service hospital with 75 beds and 24-hour staffing. Currently there are 15 full-time doctors, 21 part-time doctors, 91 nurses and cleaning workers, and 12 administrative staff. In 2012, the hospital treated 3,000 inpatients and carried out 3,156 surgeries.

# Training

Harpur Memorial Hospital is a teaching hospital, and has regular in-service training programs for its own staff, staff from other hospitals and medical students. In January 2014, the <u>Pan-African Academy of Christian Surgeons</u> (PAACS) opened a residency program in general surgery. This program will enable participating Egyptian doctors to experience surgical training at the same level of competency as surgical trainees receive in North America. PAACS provides a systematic, 5-year program of academic, clinical and technical training, under the close supervision of internationally certified professors.

# Building Bridges

The hospital provides a model of 'life dialogue' that seeks the welfare of all people. It is not a theoretical or theological engagement but it involves serving and loving our neighbours, both Muslim and Christian. This is a powerful way of engaging with our communities, especially at Harpur where over 95% of the patients are Muslim. Over recent years, the hospital has partnered with <u>Misr il-Kheir</u>, an Islamic NGO chaired by the former Grand Mufti Dr Ali Gomaa, to do medical outreaches in villages in Menoufia and low-cost cataract surgeries.

## Medical Outreaches

In 2010, a mobile medical clinic was donated to the hospital. This bus is used for medical outreaches in villages in Menoufia and urban slum areas. In 2013, over 4,800 patients were examine during 34 outreaches. The consultations and medicine are provided at a very low cost, and follow-up care at the hospital is provided at a discounted price.





## **Outpatient Services**

Over recent years, there has been a rapid increase in the number of outpatients. In 2013, the hospital treated 122,615 outpatients, double the number of outpatients in 2009 (58,460 outpatient visits).

The hospital aims to provide all diagnostic and curative services in the same day, rather than admitting inpatients. This lowers the costs for the patients, and allows them to return to their homes and work the same day. Also, all of the diagnostic tests, consultations and medication are provided at the hospital, which is more convenient for the patients.

The hospital provides clinics in the following specialty areas; internal medicine, hepatology, gynaecology, pediatrics, dermatology, ophthalmology, dentistry ENT, orthopedics, physiotherapy, surgery, neurosurgery, psychiatry, neurology, cardiology and echocardiography.

The current outpatient clinic is one of the original buildings of the hospital from 1910. Because of it's age, and the continuing growth in the number of outpatients, a new outpatient clinic is urgently needed.


# MENOUF

Menouf is located 75 kilometres north-west of Cairo in the delta region of Egypt. About 700,000 people live in Menouf; 65% of whom live in unplanned areas which lack basic services. The population of the Governate of Menoufia is around 4 million, with a population density of more than 1,500 people per square kilometre.



The area has rich agricultural land, as the tributaries of the Nile provide irrigation. The majority of the people work as farmers and their income is derived from the sale of their produce. Most of the population lives on less than 300 Egyptian pounds (\$45 USD) per month. Menoufia as a region has a higher percentage of Muslims than other parts of Egypt and it is estimated that over 95% of the population are Muslim

Harpur Memorial Hospital in Menouf primarily serves the city of Menouf and the surrounding villages, although patients also come from neighboring governates such as Beheira.



# WHY HARPUR?

## Meeting Unmet Needs

Harpur Memorial Hospital provides a unique service in Menoufia. A World Bank study found that most people in Menoufia chose to go to a private hospital despite the higher cost.<sup>1</sup> The most common reasons given were the lack of medical supplies, the limited opening hours, and few qualified staff at government hospitals. As Harpur is a charity hospital which provides quality medical care at affordable prices, it is meeting unmet health needs in Menoufia especially for the poor.

# Qualified and Committed Staff

The same study found that on average 32% of government employees were absent at any given time. The opening hours at government hospitals are often limited to only a morning shift, as the majority of doctors also run a private practice in the afternoon to increase their income.

When asked why they come to Harpur, patients consistently state that "the staff are more caring and the service is better." The staff includes many well-trained specialists, and all of the doctors choose to take a lower salary than they could earn in private practice, because they are committed to serving the sick.



One doctor at Harpur who previously worked at a government hospital says; "There the government didn't give us enough medical supplies and neglected

patients. Here patients are the most important people. The staff work together to find a solution. We are servants of the patients and we want to give maximum help."



# Affordability

Because of the limitations of government hospitals, the study found that patients preferred private health care facilities. However, a third of patients surveyed said there were occasions when lack of money kept them from seeking medical care. Private hospital fees are much higher, especially for diagnostic tests, inpatient services and surgery. Since the average monthly income is 300LE (\$45USD), this represents a significant financial burden and a barrier to accessing quality health care, especially for the poorest patients.

Harpur Memorial Hospital seeks to provide 'day care,' where all the diagnostic and curative services are provided in the same day. This reduces the cost for the patients, who are able to return to work and avoid paying inpatient fees. The prices at Harpur Memorial Hospital in Menouf are equivalent to the fees charged at government facilities, but the medical service is superior and poor patients are not turned away.

## Hygiene and Supplies

The lack of basic medical supplies and the poor hygiene at government hospitals were a major complaint in the study. Many of the hospital directors in the study said they could not guarantee a continued supply of medication to their patients, and 88% of patients interviewed reported buying medicine outside the hospital. The pharmacy at Harpur is well-stocked, and serves 350-500 patients per day (compared to 100 patients per day 5 years ago). Harpur also maintains a high level of hygiene and cleanliness.


# NEED FOR NEW OUTPATIENT CLINIC

Harpur's unique service is evidenced by the huge growth in the number of patients in recent years. The most effective way to improve and expand the hospital's services to the people of Menoufia is through a new outpatient clinic.

## Growth in Outpatients

Harpur Memorial Hospital has experienced rapid growth in recent years, particularly in the number of patients visiting the outpatient clinic, which has doubled in five years (see graph right).

The current outpatient clinic is a one storey building which provides family care services such as dermatology, gynaecology, paediatrics, dental care, ophthalmology, internal medicine, orthopaedics, and emergency care. The existing building has the capacity to serve approximately 100 patients/day, making it seriously inadequate for current patient loads which often exceeds 500 patients per day.



## Lack of Waiting Areas

There are insufficient waiting areas for outpatients, forcing many patients to wait outside or in the hallways. The hallways are narrow and are usually very congested, making it difficult to access the clinics. The director of the outpatient services says; "As there is not enough waiting areas, the corridors become crowded and people often get angry and shout and try to get into the clinics. When the weather is hot, people become more tense. If there was more space and air-conditioning, it would make waiting easier."

The new outpatient building will provide waiting rooms with sufficient space as well as specific waiting spaces for the clinics with the highest volume.

# Lack of Space for Clinics


There are insufficient rooms for clinics for all the specialities and doctors. Some outpatient clinics have to use inpatient rooms to see outpatients, and other clinics have to stop when the room they are using is needed. This shortage increases the waiting times and the number of patients the hospital can treat, and limits the specialty clinics that the hospital can offer. The clinics are also too small, especially when there is more than one patient being examines such as the ophthalmology clinic.

The design of the new outpatient clinic will increase the number of clinic spaces available, allowing the hospital to care for more patients, and expand its specialties to include mammography, trauma, separate emergency rooms for adults and children, low cost cataract surgery, or lithotripsy. The design of the new clinic provides flexible clinical spaces that can expand and contract with community need and respond to changes in health-care.



## **Outdated Facilities**

The current building is one of the original buildings of the hospital, built in the early 20th century. It was originally designed to be the inpatient department, and was later converted to an outpatient clinic. The building was gradually extended as the number of patients grew. The hospital has been renovating and patching the building for years, but it is far too small and the wear is showing. The haphazard growth has made it impossible to arrange the clinics logically, and it is difficult for the patients to find the clinics. The plumbing in the building is inadequate, and water leaks into the building when it rains. A new building is needed, which will provide for the current number of patients, and the future needs of the hospital.



# EXPERTISE AND SUSTAINABILITY

Harpur Memorial Hospital in Menouf has over 100 years of experience in providing health care to Menoufia, Currently there are 15 full-time doctors, 21 part-time doctors, 91 nurses and cleaning workers, and 12 administrative staff. The Medical Director is Dr. Samir Rizkallah, who has served as a doctor for many years and has a Masters in Gynaecology.

Harpur Memorial Hospital provides a leading role for Christian hospitals in Egypt. In 2013, the Anglican Church organised a Christian Hospitals Medical Conference (pictured right), which resulted in the formation of a Christian Medical Hospital network.

The hospital is self-sustaining as the fees from the patients and the pharmacy cover the running costs of the hospital. However, for large new projects such as the outpatient clinic, external support is needed.



# ARCHITECTURAL PLANNING



International Design and Development (IDD) created the conceptual design for the new outpatient clinic. An international team, including a specialist healthcare architect, spent 10 days at the hospital assessing the current site and consulting with the staff about the needs for the new clinic. During this time, they created several designs and presented them to the staff who provided feedback and iterative changes were made to the design.

IDD mobilizes teams of design professionals who use their design skills to serve the poor by partnering with organizations around the world who have a vision to help their local communities. We estimate that IDD's contribution is equivalent to a donation of a least \$50,000.

IDD has permanent staff working in Cairo who are continuing to work in partnership with Harpur Memorial Hospital to complete this project. IDD have contracted an Egyptian engineer to create detailed drawings for construction, based on the existing conceptual designs.

# NEW OUTPATIENT BUILDING

The design for the new clinic is a two-storey building (in blue below), which will replace the existing outpatient building. It is designed to efficiently accommodate the increased patient load, as well as future growth as the building can be extended up to seven floors (as pictured below).



# Details of the New Building

The needed facilities for the new outpatient building fall into three categories: clinical segments, core support, and support services.

<u>Clinical segments</u> are divided into medical specialties and function as separate offices, however sharing certain central public facilities, such as waiting areas, toilets, and dining room. The individual clinical segments are:

- Dermatology
- Gynecology
- Pediatrics
- Dental
- Ophthalmology
- General Surgery
- Emergency
- Internal Medicine
- Orthopedics

<u>Core support</u> provides supplemental services shared by all clinical segments. In this design, core support services were placed on the Ground Floor for easy access. These services are:

- Pharmacy
- Laboratory
- Radiology
- Cashier

Support services for the hospital include:

- Kitchen
- Laundry
- Storage
- IT
- Administration


## **Building Phases**

The construction project has three phases, which are designed to keep all current services operational during the construction of the clinic.

## Phase 1

A two-story "z" shaped building footprint that leaves most of the existing outpatient clinic as well as the existing laundry and canteen facilities accessible and operational.

This includes: x-ray, pharmacy, support services, gynecology, dermatology, 5 exam rooms, and 3 procedure rooms.



# Phase 2

Core support, excluding x-ray, remains operational in the existing outpatient building along with cashier, restrooms, and four exam rooms.

Several clinical segments and support services are now operational from Phase 1 of the new Outpatient Building.


Phase 2 includes: new entrance, larger waiting area, general surgery, and the lab.

# Phase 3

The remaining portion of the existing outpatient building is demolished and all outpatient services are utilized in the new building, excluding the services transferred to the inpatient clinic prior to Phase 1.


Phase 3 includes orthopaedic clinic, parking, dental clinic and the paediatrics clinic.

They gave me injections and medicine which didn't help and I wasn't checked up on. I was then brought to Harpur. The doctors came quickly and examined me. They showed commitment and respect for me. They kept checking up on me, and thanks be to God, through their intervention the bleeding stopped. The doctors . After this experience, the ceramic company I work for cancelled the contract with the private hospital and started a contract with Harpur."

"I am from a near-by village and I've come to the hospital many times. I come here because the medical consultation is good, and it is affordable. I've been to governmental hospitals and there is little care, it is crowded, and there is not enough time for a thorough consultation."

"All of the doctors are good, and they look after the children. This hospital is different from other hospitals I've been to as this hospital cares for the patients. It is a caring hospital."

#### Rasha

"I come to this hospital as the prescriptions are more accurate than government hospitals. The medicine they prescribe fixes the problem. Here the doctors care for the patients. The staff in the government hospital didn't talk to me in a polite way."

## Ali Mohamed Aly

"I come to this hospital because of the quality of the doctors. They are professional and better than other places."

#### Mohamed

"I've been coming here for 30 years. The doctors provide good medical advice and care for the patients. When I went to other hospitals, I felt they didn't care for me, and there was negligence even in private hospitals. The most important thing in private hospitals is to get money from the patients. For example, they request unnecessary investigations just to get money. In 2005, I went to private hospital and they told me that I needed surgery. I came to Harpur for another opinion, and the surgeon said I didn't need treatment and prescribed medicine instead. Because of the faithfulness of this doctor, I was saved from an unnecessary operation. It cost me 26 Egyptian pounds(\$4) for the medicine and exam at Harpur, and it would have cost 750-1,000 (\$115-\$150) for the operation."

#### Sama

I am from Barheem, a village near Menouf. I've been coming here since my daughter (pictured left) was born. I've been to government hospitals before. There is chaos there, you keep asking for a doctor, and no-one helps you. Here there is a system and you can see a doctor. The doctors are better here; it is easy to talk with them and discuss the treatment.

#### Sahil

I've come here many times. The treatment is good. The doctors are respectful and humble. In government hospitals, the nurses didn't care and didn't answer my questions. Here they make sure the patients understand. All the investigations are in one place which makes it easier for the patients.

These costs were estimated on an average unit cost basis of 2,700 EGP per square meter. This includes structure, electrical wiring, simple finishing and two service elevators. The detailed breakdown is based on the size of the departments.
